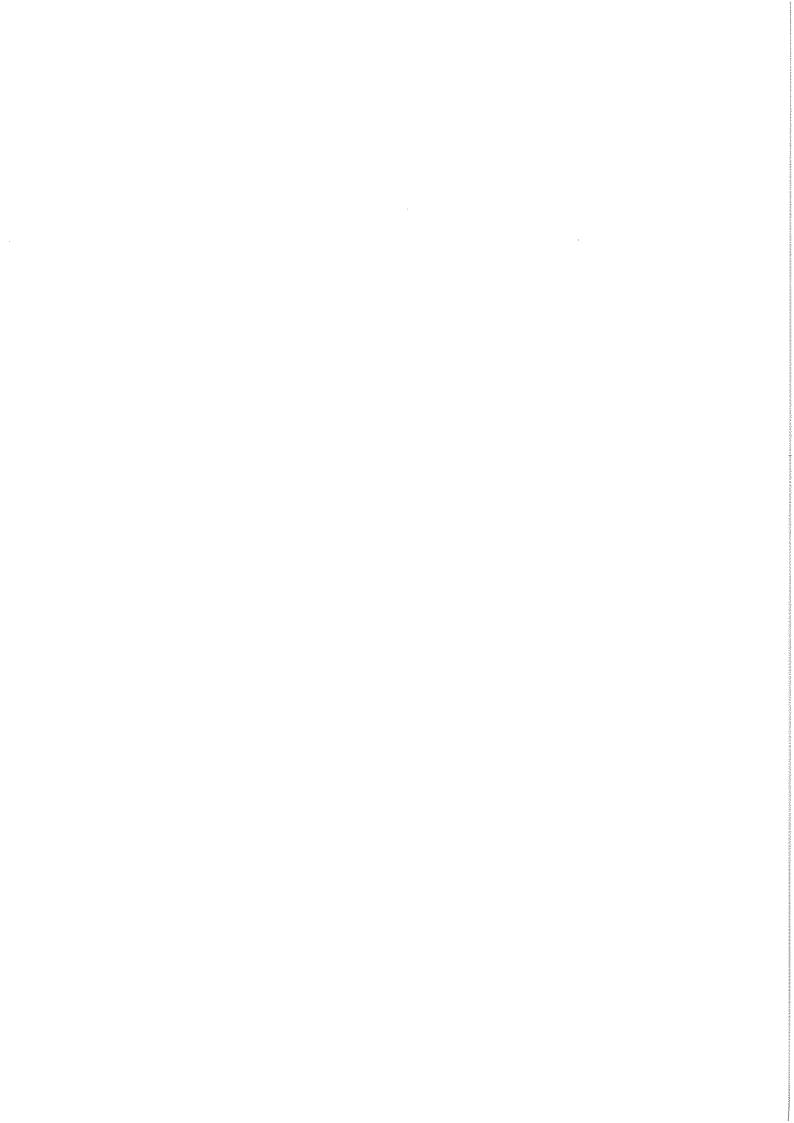

Minutes of the 40th Annual General Meeting of Knighton Heath Golf Club Ltd held on Thursday 20 October 2016 at 19:30pm in the Clubhouse, Francis Avenue, Bournemouth, BH11 8NX,

The President, Alan Hebditch welcomed all members and especially the new members who are attending for the first time.

He introduced the top table; Chairman, Martin Collins, Captain, Pat Peiro, new Ladies Captain & Finance Consultant, Debbie Lennon, General Manager, Reunert Bauser and Mark Magrath from Harrisons, the club auditors.

The President confirmed that as 74 members entitled to vote were in attendance, with 52 votes received from members unable to attend, this constituted a quorum in terms of Rule 19.5 of the Articles of Association and declared the meeting open.

1 social member was also in attendance.

1. Apologies

Apologies were received from: David & Debbie Barrett, Gary Cutler, George Davies, Len & Jan Elliott, Maurice Randall, Paul Townsend, Trevor Townsend, & Mike Wakeham as well as the 52 members who voted, but were unable to attend.

2. In Memoriam

All those present stood in silence in memory of all long-standing and well-respected members who had passed away since the last meeting.

The President mentioned Les Tanswell, David Gill, Derek Collins, Eddie Cockrill, Jack Johnson, Mike Kirby & Mick Brown and any others missed.

3. Minutes of last meeting

The minutes of the 39th AGM held on 22 October 2015 had been circulated.

Mr B Kennedy proposed that the minutes of 16 October 2014 be taken as read. Seconded: D Gritt

On a show of hands the minutes of 22 October 2015 were unanimously confirmed as a true record and the President was authorised to sign them.

There were no matters arising.

4. Management & Captains Committee Resolution

Before the President handed over to the club Chairman, Mr J Bowden raised the following questions as to resolution 4 (a) rationale;

- Over-burdening of officers & under-utilisation of others
- Blurred lines of authority
- Lack of clarity for members

The Chairman, Mr M Collins, tabled the following statement in support of the single committee structure.

"As you can see there are 2 resolutions on this years" agenda.

The 1st resolution is to combine the two existing committees', the Captains and Management Committees, to form one administration and management body, the Board of Directors. If you turn to page 12 and 13 you can read the rationale for the proposed single committee. On Page 14 and 15 you will see the proposed amendments to the Articles of Association to affect the change to a single committee structure.

From a personal point of view, having been on the Management and Captains Committees, I have seen an awful lot of repetition and decisions being passed back and forth between the two

As the club is in direct competition with other surrounding clubs, to retain and increase our membership, the club has to be run as effectively and efficiently as possible within a modern business structure.

Tradition has its place and always will in a golf club, but in the modern business world the club needs to be focused with a single unified body making sound business decisions, but never forgetting that we are still a member's golf club.

Therefore I would like, on behalf of both Committees, to propose the adoption of item 4 (a) on the agenda together with the relevant amendments as detailed in the Article of Association.

Mr B Kennedy then tabled and read out the following statement: "First two points for clarification:

amendments to the Articles.

President supported by the General Manager.

- Please confirm that if any Captain or Vice-Captain is elected as a Director their term of
 office will be for the one year only. The Chairman confirmed that this was the case as
 detailed in the proposed amendments to the Articles.
- Please also confirm that an alternative (i.e. his or her Vice if elected as a Director) may only attend a meeting if the relevant Captain cannot attend.
 The Chairman confirmed that this was the case as detailed in the proposed

Prior to 1997 we had a combination of Captains and Directors as the Management Committee (or Board). Up to 17 sat at each meeting. The meetings were very long and frequently indecisive. The AGM that year agreed to form two committees — one to use the facilities and the other to provide them. This is the current structure. It works well provided they each keep to their own areas of responsibility. The referee to ensure this is the

The smaller Management Committee meant that those most suitable for election as Directors could be nominated. Golf Captains are not necessarily the best qualified to manage, although there are exceptions of course.

One of the most important issues for good management is continuity. The proposed structure could provide at least three Directors who, whatever their capability, would serve for just one year. It takes time for a Director to bed in and no sooner has he or she done so they must retire. Continuity would certainly be affected.

One additional point is that fostering Juniors in the club is important in growing future membership. The proposed Board does not provide a suitable voice for either the Juniors or the Club Professional.

Although I support the idea of a small, tight and capable Board to manage the club's affairs I seriously question the value of the current proposal to provide such a body.

I strongly suggest that the proposal is shelved and that both committees examine a much more suitable alternative structure such as one along the lines recently adopted by Bridport Golf Club."

M Collins responded and said that both Committees had given the proposed structure a great deal of thought and agreed that the proposal on the table was the one that best suited KHGC. The Juniors would be represented by one of the Directors as part of the portfolio.

After a lengthy debate on the pros and cons of the structure the majority of the members agreed that item 4 (a) should be voted on immediately. Members were instructed to tear off the top half of the voting paper in order to vote on the 2 items.

The Chairman, Mr M Collins tabled and read out a statement in support of Mr E Hiscock receiving Life Membership.

"Both the Management and Captain's committee would like to propose Mr Eric Hiscock for life membership.

Eric has been a member for at least 30 years. In fact I think according to the club records it's probably 38 years, I've ask him and he can't remember it was that long ago.

Eric has supported the club in so many ways over the years I could make a list as long as my arm covering the things he has done, so I will highlight just a few.

He has served on the committee at least 3 times dedicating his time to help run the club through the good and bad times.

He has played in countless numbers of new members, in fact I dare say many of you here tonight were played in by him.

He has organised many charity events at the club. Helped out in and supplied the halfway house over the years. He has marshalled and refereed many competitions. Organised turkey trots when we still got turkey's if you won.

He has put his name to one of our trophy events played for every year.

Most of you won't know that he was one of the people who designed the club logo we all wear on our t shirts and jumpers.

He has been an active member of the Dorset captains and still attends some of the functions organised during the year. I can say he is excellent company at the annual Dorset golf dinner.

If you have ever spoken to him you will know he is Knighton Heath through and through. He adores the club and even when many of his piers left for supposedly better clubs he stayed and supported the development of what we have today.

I dare say that Eric was probably due the honour of life membership many years ago.

Finally Eric has also been club captain and president during which he and others like him have helped grow this club into what it is today, a healthy club firmly grounded in its core values of being a welcoming and friendly club with an excellent but challenging course, a club to be proud of.

It is therefore with great pleasure that I support the proposal from both committees to bestow the honour of Life Membership on Mr Eric Hiscock. "

The President then asked the members to vote on items 4 (a) and (b).

4 (a) that the Club's Committee structure is changed to achieve a single, slimmer and more efficient and focused management group named the Board of Directors.

The members voted by ballot and the result was; For – 70, Against – 38, Abstentions – 8 (64.8%)

The resolution did not acquire the necessary 3/3 (72) majority and was therefore not passed.

4 (b) Mr E Hiscock - Life Membership

The members voted by ballot and the result was; For – 98, Against – 9, Abstentions – 9

The resolution did acquire the necessary 50% majority and was therefore passed. Mr Hiscock would become a Life Member of the club.

5. Members Resolutions

6. Chairman's Report

A detailed report had been circulated.

Mr Collins highlighted the following;

"The club has had another positive year. The course in is great shape, membership is continuing to grow and the finances are looking favourable.

Plans for the refurbishment are well on the way and will start this winter. It has been a long wait for the locker rooms to be done, and I feel it will make a big difference to the look and feel of the club house.

In my report there is a long list of thank you's, but just to recap:

Many thanks to all the staff of this club both in house and on the course, they have done fantastic work and it's been noticed by many of the visitors. Thanks also go to Andy our Pro, to Reunert for his work again this year keeping the club running smoothly and for his valuable advice.

As you are all aware, this is my last year on the Board. I think I am standing down at a time when the club is in good health, and its future looks even better.

This is due to a lot of hard work from a lot of people. The Directors and Captains have helped immensely and I thank all the past and present committee members for their dedication to the club.

I will be watching you all from the side lines, making sure you all keep the positive momentum in the club.

Thank you all for your support over the years, it has been an education!!"

The President thanked Mr Collins for his tireless work during the years on the Committee.

The majority of the members voted, by a show of hands, to accept the adoption of the report.

7. Financial Director's Report

A detailed report had been circulated.

Mrs Lennon highlighted the following;

"Good evening everyone. I hope you have all had a chance to read through the annual accounts for the year ending June 2016.

I am pleased that I can sit here and present the Finance Report for a year that has been a much more positive one from a financial perspective. As you are all aware we have gained a large number of new members and the winter weather was much kinder to us than in previous years.

I do not intend to read out my report from the Annual Report this evening however the main point to note is that whilst overall we reported a surplus of £11,354 for the year the reclaiming of voluntary/compulsory loans from members (*rule 5.9.3*) who had left the club of £11k was a major factor in us reporting a profit.

As many of our new members joined only part way through the year the full effect on the accounts will not be shown until the accounts for next year.

Income increased year on year by £28k. Apart from the reclaiming of voluntary /compulsory loans this was due to Increased Subscription and Green fee income, £17k.

Expenses increased year on year by £20k. The main contributing factors were;

- Course upkeep increased by £22k, salaries (additional staff member) and course improvements
- Services to members decreased by £4k as a result of a change in the timing of our payment to the DCGU for our affiliation fees this is now made following renewals. The amount reported reflects only a part year payment and this figure will therefore be significantly larger next year.
- Club house expenses increased by £2k or 2%
- Admin increased by £11k just to clarify to everyone this increase was due to the full
 year effect of a member of staff moving into Administration, the salary increase for the
 General Manager as a result of his increased responsibilities and the annual pay-rise
 awarded.
- Finance down by £5k due mainly to reduction in bank interest payable and a reduction in hire purchase/ finance leases charges
- Depreciation down by £5k due to the write off of assets in the Fixed Asset Register.

The Seniors and Ladies sections both reported surpluses in their Profit and Loss accounts and contributed a further £3k to the Club surplus for the year.

During the year we purchased some capital items for the course including a hedge trimmer, fairway brush, hand mower and a panel van (£1800) which is mainly used to transport fuel to the club. In addition 4 winter tee mats were purchased (£1400). In the clubhouse a number of small value items were purchased including a new touch screen TV (£500) in the lobby and a fridge and freezer for the kitchen.

Since I wrote my report we have an additional 34 new playing Members bringing the total Playing members to 516. Our total club membership is now 615, this includes Juniors and Social members.

The future is certainly looking brighter for Knighton Heath Golf Club.

I wish my successor, Des Spencer, all the very best in his role as FD. I would like to also take this opportunity to thank Reunert, Pat, Alan, Sandra and Trish and all their staff very much for all their help and support during my time on the Management Committee"

Mr B Kennedy asked as to the cost of the clubhouse refurbishment. Mrs Lennon said that the total cost was £85k funded by a loan from the bank at base plus 3%.

There were no further questions and Mr D Gritt proposed the adoption of the report with Mrs D Knight seconding.

The majority of the members voted, by a show of hands, to accept the adoption of the report.

8. Captain's Report

Mr Peiro highlighted items from his report which had been circulated.

He also added that it was an honour and a privilege to serve KHGC and that he had enjoyed his year.

During his year £ 1 739.59 had been raised by the members, which would go towards upgrading the playing part of the course.

The majority of the members voted, by a show of hands, to accept the adoption of the report.

9. Appointment of Auditors

The President proposed that Harrisons had been the club auditors since 1997 and he saw no reason to dispense with their services.

Mr M Collins seconded the proposal.

On a show of hands the majority of the members voted in favour of retaining the services of Harrisons.

Mr Magrath thanked the members and said that the club had recorded a healthy surplus in 2016 and that the forecast for 2017 was just as good with both clubhouse and course improvements.

10. Election of Office Bearers

a) Captain - Mr T Townsend - proposed Mr P Peiro, seconded by Mr J Airth.

The members voted by a ballot as follows: For -111 Against -3 Abstentions -5

Mr T Townsend was duly elected as Club Captain for 2016/17

Mr Townsend was unfortunately unable to attend the meeting, however the President read out a statement;

"Firstly please accept my humblest apologies for not being able to make this very short speech in person, but I am sunning myself in Portugal.

I am delighted to be Captain of the club for the coming year. I feel it is an honour to be selected and being in this position as an ambassador for the club, is, in my opinion all about promoting the course, the staff and above all you the members.

I will do as much as I can to support each section where necessary as well as being available to all members either on the phone or email, no matter how trivial the question may be.

Of course, all barracking from the 19th will be welcomed and encouraged, so long as it is finished with Mr Captain SIR!!

Whilst this may not be the right time, I wanted to add something. A good club usually has a good club professional. A great club has a great club professional. And we are a great club. So from me personally, I would like to thank Andy for everything he has done over the last year. He really is an asset to the club.

I'd like to take this opportunity to say thank you to you all in anticipation of a very successful year for the club at all levels."

c) Vice-Captain - Mr A Groom - proposed by Mr T Townsend, seconded by Mr M Randall.

The members voted by a ballot as follows: For -113 Against -0 Abstentions -3

Mr A Groom was duly elected as Vice-Captain for 2016/17.

11. Election of Finance Director

Mr D Spencer - proposed by Mrs D Lennon, seconded by Mr M Collins

Mr B Kennedy said that as a point to note that there was no restriction on the length of time a Director had to be a member.

The members voted by a ballot as follows:

For - 110 Against - 0 Abstentions - 3

Mr D Spencer was duly elected as Finance Director for 2016/17.

The President thanked Mrs Lennon for her service to the club over the last 7 years.

12. Election of Directors

The President said that according to our Articles the Committee can accommodate up to nine Directors.

Each proposer was invited in turn to introduce their proposed candidate. The candidate was also asked to stand and say a few words about what he/she feels that they would be able to contribute to the good management of the Club.

The nominations received were:

Messrs Gritt, Harrington, Lennon and O'Hara were duly elected as Directors for a 3 year term of office.

The President congratulated the new Directors of Knighton Heath Golf Club Limited.

12. Any other business

No items had been received in terms of the club rules.

Closing of the meeting

The President thanked everyone for attending the AGM and those who had made their contribution to it by way of their reports. He thanked Mark Magrath for attending on behalf of Harrisons, and also the volunteers who checked attendees in and the vote counters.

He acknowledged the contribution made by the Junior Committee with Andy Windsor and once again with Barry Channon at the helm.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

On behalf of the Management Committee I am pleased to report a great year for Knighton Heath Golf Club in all respects in the running of the Club.

For me it has been an interesting and on occasions challenging year and yet I have enjoyed the honour of being your Chairman.

We have seen many new members from various clubs in the region join, a belated welcome. I hope that you now feel part of the Club and will fully integrate with existing members.

The year did not start as well as expected with an attempt through a cyber-attack to defraud the Club of money. The cyber-attack was immediately spotted by our General Manager and with his team the attempt was prevented from damaging the Club. Following this attempt to defraud the Club the Committee reviewed what had happened and how. It was realised that some of our procedures and policies where not as robust as we had thought. To that end over the last six months much work has been undertaken to create a process to protect the Club and prevent the incident reoccurring. Passwords and computer operating programmes have also been changed to further protect our Club.

At this moment in time the Committee is confident that the Club is in a better and safer position than before, but things do change, so the team will have to remain vigilant at all times.

Knighton Heath has had record numbers of visitors this year. This in turn has placed many demands on our small team of greenkeepers led by Alan. What the team produce is a credit to them, and it is all produced within budget constraints. Apart from the weather interference, the course is always presented in the best possible condition, for playing the game we love – many thanks Alan and to your team.

With that in mind the main thrust of planning is where it should be - on the golf course

The Committee has just approved Alan's proposal of work for this winter:

- Install winter mats on the last two tees 3rd & 9th
- Create and improve the path from 6th green to 7th tee
- Level the 13th tee box and remove trees front right to improve view of the hole
- Install new drainage in front left of 4th green and shallow steepness of banking at the rear
- Attempt to install drainage under the practice green to improve all year use

As you can see they will be busy and I ask for your patience while the work is completed. Please bear in mind that this list is not exhaustive, but just part of what Alan would like to do in the up and coming years.

The Committee has also approved the renewal of the machinery contract for a further five years, this will result in half of our aging equipment being replaced and you will see the benefits of this being used out on the course. We have been given a long term loan of a greens iron, so we will have to wait and see if it helps to straighten out the putting for some of our members!

This year has also seen the start of a programme to refurbish areas within the Clubhouse, hopefully you have seen and approve of what we are trying to achieve in moving the Club forward. The work will continue as and when the Committee feels that the Club is in a position to do so, some of the things being planned – Showers (male & female), Patio area (enlarging).

I would like to thank both Reunert Bauser (General Manager) and Des Spencer (Finance Director) for their hard work in balancing the books and keeping the Committee within budgets.

I would also like to thank my fellow Directors for their support this year and for their honesty in the discussions and decisions that have been made through the year – not always easy.

Please do remember that the Committee is made up of members, who give up their time freely to run the golf club on behalf of the membership.

A golf club is often measured by the atmosphere people feel when they come in through the front door and that is created by the staff that welcomes them.

In the bar David, Tom and team, in the kitchen Trish and team - a big thank you from me. The feedback we get from visitors speaks volumes for their work.

I also thank our professional Andy and his team, since the day Andy arrived he has enhanced the standing of Knighton Heath Golf Club, where ever he goes Andy promotes the Club, for this and much more I thank you on behalf of the membership.

The Club Captain, Trevor Townsend, has overseen a busy year and has managed to balance work and his role very well, ably supported by his Vice Captain Andy Groom

Finally I thank the members for all of their continued support and input as to how the Club can and should improve – another big thank you from me.

I look forward to another year of debate around a table, with a diverse collection of people looking to the future and making Knighton Heath Golf Club one of the best.

Advertising & Membership - Bill Lennon

This year has seen a steady increase in membership across the majority of categories.

We have been fortunate enough to benefit from both the closure of Canford GC both directly and as a result of the re-settling of their membership via other local clubs, notably Bulbury Woods.

We increased our Full members by 69 during the year June 2016 to June 2017 with the overall Total Playing membership increasing by 93 over the same period.

Resignations for the year totalled 61 which, was in line with expected budget numbers.

At the end of June 2017, Full Members stood at 342, whilst the total Playing membership was a healthy 499.

These compared to June 2016 closing numbers of 345 and 480 respectively.

A better than expected increase in the ladies section saw numbers rise from 55 to 68 during the last year.

Overall Total Playing members are at the highest since June 2012, but still below those recorded as at June 2011, when we had 510 Playing Members.

Expectations are that current numbers will continue to increase during 2017-2018 across the majority of categories.

Please be assured that the directors are monitoring the overall numbers regularly to ensure the correct balance is maintained to ensure the best proposition for all our members going forward.

Course - Barry Channon

I would like to thank Alan and his team for all the hard work they put into our golf course they work with limited man power but still produce a great course for the enjoyment of all our members.

The course work that has been done over this year, paths, winter mats has only added to the playability of the course during the winter months, our greens staff must be commended for carrying out these works in house and not outsourcing to outside contractors saving the club a great amount of money.

We still have a issue with a large number of trees around the course, these issues are a ongoing challenge to our Green keepers, many have been assessed as having a risk to members and the occupants of the houses along the 15th fairway, with some very important work required to keep our neighbours safe. Other trees and tree roots are also causing us some issues with the substructure of a number of greens causing us issues with the quality of the grass on the greens, this problem I'm afraid to say this is not going to go away with the trees getting older more work is going to be required.

The "stones in bunkers" is an issue that's worsening and will definitely need to be addressing sooner rather than later, it's a constant item on our agenda with no miracle quick fix solution.

With the delivery of the new green keeping machinery this will help Alan and his team to produce an even better looking course throughout the year, hopefully this time next year the membership will agree this was money well spent.

The course is going in the right direction we have had an increased number of visitors and societies at the club this year with many repeat bookings, our open competitions have all had a full start sheets with plenty of comments on how great the course looked, our membership numbers are increasing we understand the need to keep up all the hard work that has been carried out over a great number of years, we can't take anything for granted we need to keep improving and moving the course forward. With another winter projects season coming up there will be plenty of work going on to improve the course.

We are trying to keep the membership updated with newsletters, notice board postings, it's an ongoing issue to keep the membership up-to-date with the latest projects that are going on throughout the year, if I doubt please ask.

Finance - Des Spencer

Report on Period ending 30th June 2017 – Audited Accounts

You will note changes to our audited Financial Statements with terms changed and additional reports. These differences are due to the first year of Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS102) the requirements under this standard mean greater disclosure and changes to terms and layouts.

During the year the Club was subject to changes in both the minimum wage and workplace pension scheme, all of which increased costs. A further cost was incurred in updating all of our computer software to maintain our defences against malware, plus a review of our Human Resources documentation required us to update the Contract(s) of Employment and Company Handbook to comply with the ever changing legislation.

A further change in the year was the change in banking procedures which now mean that two people are required before any monies can move from our current account.

Statement of Comprehensive Income (Profit & Loss Account)

The financial year 1st July2016 to the 30th June 2017 was a good year for the Club with increases in both Members subscriptions, Green Fees and a profitable outcome from the Bar & Catering operation. There was also the payment by HMRC of our VAT claim (£21,454). Overall the Profit for the Year was £71,073.

Total Turnover increased from £653,358 to £786,318.

The Bar & Catering Operations produced a surplus of £26,443 in 2017 which was better than the previous year's £24,078.

The Upkeep of the Course expenses was £201,505 which was more than the previous year's £179,065. The increase in expenses included for:-

Increases in wage costs, Repairs to Tractor, Replacement of Irrigation Control, Contracted Maintenance (Verti-Drain & Aeration), Tree Maintenance (this as our trees reach maturity will be a significant area of expenditure), Course Marshall (this position has now been made redundant)

The Services to Members expenses for 2017 were £50,741 against £41,882 for 2016. The main areas of increased expenditure are:-

EGU/DGU Fees, with more members the expense is greater, also the fees were increased and lastly there was a change by DGU in the timing of collection of the fees. Members Discount for Bar & Catering was higher as Members spent more.

The Clubhouse expenses were only slightly more than last year despite having to spend over £3,000 on emergency roof repairs, some items that were specific for the catering operations have been moved out of this cost centre and moved to the expenses section of Catering where they properly belong.

The Administration expenses rose from £76,422 in 2016 to £83,863 in 2017. Increases in expenses for Payroll, Audit, Computer and Advertising rose due to recruitment adverts and fees payable to our Agent in respect of the VAT repayment.

The Finance and interest charges for the year were £38,708 against £32,145 in 2016. The Bank interest was higher as the Club took out an additional loan in November 2016 to pay for the upgrade of the locker rooms and additional items. Our lease payments fell as we draw near to the end of our contract (however we have spent over £175K in September 2017 on new course machinery which will increase this cost next year. The irrecoverable VAT rose to £21,263 from £17,802 last year. Our recoverable percentage is now 32%.

Depreciation charges (a non-cash item that is used to write off the value of an asset over its expected life) were higher this year at £33,745 which is more than last year's £30,958, however the Asset value from which this is calculated has risen (see Balance Sheet).

Balance Sheet

The Fixed Assets have increased to £601,675 from £557,464 in 2016. The changes are due to the write off of the depreciation and the purchase of Carpets Lockers, new Switchboxes, Boiler, Ice M/C, Computers, Notice Boards, Coffee m/c, Till, & Hand Driers in total £97,311. The disposals were writing off of the old changing room items and its accumulated depreciation.

The Club has four long term loans with Lloyds Bank totalling £148,694 as at 30th June 2017 the principal repayments last year totalled £32,250 and £7,257 for interest payments. Two of these loans will come to an end in September 2017.

Additionally the Club has had a long term arrangement for the green-keeping machines purchased nearly five years ago (monthly payments around £2,600). This also ends in September 2017 this is being replaced with a further facility to cover the purchase of new equipment costing over £175,000 (£150kfor costs but plus 20K in irrecoverable VAT charge) this will cost £31,645 per annum for 5 years

Finally I wish to thank Reunert for his hard work and support and assistance during the year.

We are lucky to have a great course here, which has been maintained in to a very high standard throughout the year by our fantastic green staff, led by Alan McGee, and we as members should recognise the effort they put in on our behalf.

Reunert and the office staff (Pat and Sandra) – Thanks for all the support and assistance you have offered me during my tenure. Very much appreciated.

One thing I have learnt whilst on the committee is that they are all very focussed on the success of the club, and have the interests of all of you at heart. And if something hasn't been done, it is usually for a good reason.

My Captains Day was really well supported by you; 180 players made it a long but very enjoyable day, so thanks to all of you who took part.

Now to the club Professional and his staff, Andy has been a consummate professional and I cannot thank him enough for all the time and effort he puts into the club.

My final thanks go to all of you who put up with me for this year. We saw our membership grow I have had the privilege of playing with a lot of you during the play-in rounds. It was always a pleasure despite how good or bad I played.

Now it's time for me to hand over the role of Captain to Andy Groom. Please give him all the support you can and help in making his year a very successful one. He has said for the Captains Drive in, anything over 75 yards will be good.

Juniors - Andy Windsor

The Junior Section has seen a slight decline over the year with 21 juniors currently attached at the club, which is just down from the previous year and something that we aim to address in the future.

We have recruited 4 new juniors in the year, with the latest addition being Noah Williams (Grandson of Senior Member Anthony Williams) who joins to boost the under 14's section. The junior section has had a good year with some notable individual achievements.

Dorset Junior Knock-Out Shield:

This year the Junior Section were drawn against Dudsbury in the Quarter Finals and with 3 of our top Juniors unavailable the team played excellently to draw the Away Leg at Dudsbury GC. 1. General information

The company is a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Francis Avenue, Bournemouth, Dorset, BH11 8NX.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland'.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Transition to FRS 102

The entity transitioned from previous UK GAAP to FRS 102 as at 1 July 2015. Details of how FRS 102 has affected the reported financial position and financial performance is given in note 23.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Revenue recognition

The turnover shown in the profit and loss account represents amounts receivable during the year from members and visitors for goods provided and services rendered.

Taxation

Current tax is recognised on taxable profit for the current and, where not previously recognised, past periods. Current tax is measured at the amounts of tax expected to pay or recover using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Operating leases

Lease payments are recognised as an expense over the lease term on a straight-line basis. The aggregate benefit of lease incentives is recognised as a reduction to expense over the lease term, on a straight-line basis.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity, except to the extent it reverses a revaluation decrease of the same asset previously recognised in profit or loss. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation is recognised in other comprehensive income to the extent of any previously recognised revaluation increase accumulated in equity in respect of that asset. Where a a revaluation decrease exceeds the accumulated revaluation gains accumulated in equity in respect of that asset, the excess shall be recognised in profit or loss.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Freehold property

Plant & Equipment Furniture & Fittings

25% straight line / 10% straight line25% straight line / 10% straight line

Huts & Washdown - 5% straight line Watering System - 10% straight line

All course plant and equipment purchased since 1 July 2012, and costing in excess of £5,000, shall be depreciated on a straight line basis over its expected useful life of 10 years.

The estimated residual value of the company's freehold properties is in excess of its net book value. It is the company's policy to maintain this property so that the estimated residual value will not be impaired over time. The costs of this maintenance are charged to the profit and loss account as incurred. The directors are of the opinion that any depreciation in respect of the company's freehold property would be immaterial and consequently no provision is made in the accounts for such depreciation.

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Stocks

Stocks are measured at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost includes all costs of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the stock to its present location and condition.

Finance leases and hire purchase contracts

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts are recognised in the balance sheet as assets and liabilities at the lower of the fair value of the assets and the present value of the minimum lease payments, which is determined at the inception of the lease term. Any initial direct costs of the lease are added to the amount recognised as an asset.

Lease payments are apportioned between the finance charges and reduction of the outstanding lease liability using the effective interest method. Finance charges are allocated to each period so as to produce a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability.

Financial instruments

Financial instruments are classified and accounted for, according to the substance of the contractual arrangement, as either financial assets, financial liabilities or equity instruments. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the company after deducting all of its liabilities.

Pension costs

The company operates a defined contribution scheme for the benefit of its employees. Contributions payable are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income when due.

4. Company limited by guarantee

The company is limited by guarantee and does not have a share capital. The liability of each member in the event of the company being wound up is set out in note 20 to the financial statements.

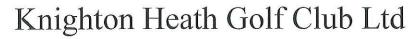
